Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you". (Jn 6:53)

At the distance of two thousand years, it is easy to read or hear the words of today's Gospel and allow their meaning almost to pass us by. Here is a real flesh and blood man saying unless you eat this flesh and drink this blood, you cannot have life within you.

It is a shocking statement in many ways and it is small wonder that the Jews argued about what he meant. Was Jesus advocating some kind of cannibalism? Was he encouraging a satanic rite of drinking human blood? What did his words mean, and how, in a culture which honored the body and held blood to be sacred, could he mean what he said?

Early Christians were indeed accused of human sacrifice, cannibalism and the drinking of human blood as people heard snippets of their beliefs: "they meet to eat flesh and drink blood". These accusations were cited as cause for persecution; after all, what civilized society would tolerate such behavior?

In response, we tend to over-spiritualize this teaching. We know that Jesus is speaking of a mystical Body and mystical Blood and that their meaning goes beyond mere altar bread and a sip of wine. We know that receiving Bread and Wine brings us into Communion with Christ himself and with all who form the Body of Christ, living and dead. We acknowledge the Mystery but shrink from trying to explain it as starkly as Jesus does in today's Gospel.

Yet, as Jesus says, this Bread, which become his flesh, this Wine, which becomes his blood, are both real. The real food and real drink speak to us of his real presence within them. If Christ is in us, then we live in Him and draw life from the Father through Him.

The moment when we hold the Bread and sip the Wine at Communion seems insignificant in the life of the world, and yet this moment brings us into communion with the eternal and transcendent. The forms of bread and wine will become subject to the natural process of digestion, their components becoming tiny parts of our own bodies. The presence of Christ within them will also act as food, but food for the spirit, food that feeds our soul and prepares us for eternal life.

Jesús les dijo: "En verdad, en verdad les digo que si no comen la carne del Hijo del Hombre y no beben su sangre, no tendrán vida en ustedes". (Juan 6:53)

A la distancia de dos mil años, es fácil leer o escuchar las palabras del Evangelio e ignorar su significado. Aquí hay un hombre real de carne y hueso diciendo que si no comes su carne y bebes su sangre, no puedes tener vida en ti.

Es una declaración sorprendente en muchos aspectos y no es de extrañar que los judíos discutían sobre lo que Jesús quería decir. ¿Estaba Jesús abogando por una especie de cannibalismo? ¿Estaba fomentando la participación en un rito satánico consistente en beber sangre humana? ¿Qué significan sus palabras y cómo - en una cultura que honra el cuerpo y la sangre es sagrada - iba a decir lo que dijo?

Los primeros cristianos fueron acusados de hecho, de sacrificio humano, cannibalismo y de beber sangre humana; se sabe que hubo gente que los acusaba de "que se reúnen para comer carne y beber sangre". Estas acusaciones fueron citadas como causa de persecución - después de todo, ¿qué sociedad civilizada podía tolerar tal comportamiento?

En respuesta a ello, tendemos a sobre-espiritualizar esta enseñanza. Sabemos que Jesús está hablando de un cuerpo místico y de una sangre mística y que su significado va más allá del simple pan del altar y de un sorbo de vino. Sabemos que la recepción del pan y del vino nos pone en comunión con Cristo y con todos los que forman el Cuerpo de Cristo - vivos y muertos. Reconocemos el misterio, pero nos abstenemos de explicarlo tan crudamente como lo hace Jesús en el Evangelio de hoy.

Sin embargo, como dice Jesús, este pan, que se convierte en su carne; y este vino, que se convierte en su sangre, son reales. La verdadera comida y verdadera bebida nos hablan de su presencia real dentro de ellos. Si Cristo está en nosotros, entonces vivimos en él y recibimos la vida del Padre a través de Jesucristo.

El momento en que comemos el pan y bebemos el vino en la comunión parece insignificante en la vida del mundo, y sin embargo, este momento nos pone en comunión con lo eterno y trascendente. Las formas del pan y del vino estarán sujetas a un proceso natural de digestión, sus componentes se vuelven partes pequeñas de nuestros propios cuerpos. La presencia de Cristo dentro de ellos actuará también como alimento, pero comida para el espíritu, la comida que alimenta nuestra alma y nos prepara para la vida eterna.
